the detroit symphony orchestra grace grit and glory details the history of the detroit symphony orchestra as seen through the prism of the city it has called home for nearly 130 years now one of america s finest orchestras the detroit symphony orchestra began in 1887 as a rather small ensemble of around thirty five players in a city that was just emerging as an industrial powerhouse since then both the city and its orchestra have known great success in musical artistry for the symphony and economic influence for the city they have each faced crises as well financial social and cultural that have forced the dso into closure three times and the city to the brink of dissolution yet somehow in

the face of adversity the dso stands strong today a beacon of perseverance and rebirth in a city of second chances this is the first history of the dso to document the orchestra from its earliest incarnation in the late nineteenth century to its current status as one of the top orchestras in the country the detroit symphony orchestra tells the story of the organization the musicians the musical directors the boards and the management as they strove for musical excellence and the consistent funding and leadership to achieve it in the changing economic and cultural landscape of detroit author laurie lanzen harris with paul ganson explores the cycles of glory collapse and renewal of the orchestra in light of the city s own dynamic economic demographic and cultural changes any reader with an interest in detroit history or the history of american symphony orchestras should have this book on his or her shelf

preface the author of this very practical treatise on scotch loch fishing desires clearly that it may be of use to all who had it he does not pretend to have written anything new but to have attempted to put what he has to say in as readable a form as possible everything in the way of the history and habits of fish has been studiously avoided and technicalities have been used as sparingly as possible the writing of this book has afforded him pleasure in his leisure moments and that pleasure would be much increased if he knew that the perusal of it would create any bond of sympathy between himself and the angling community in general this section is interleaved with blank sheets for the readers notes the author need hardly say that any suggestions addressed to the case of the publishers will meet with consideration in a future edition we do not pretend to write or enlarge upon a new subject

much has been said and written and well said and written too on the art of fishing but loch fishing has been rather looked upon as a second rate performance and to dispel this idea is one of the objects for which this present treatise has been written far be it from us to say anything against fishing lawfully practised in any form but many pent up in our large towns will bear us out when we say that on the whole a days loch fishing is the most convenient one great matter is that the loch fisher is dependent on nothing but enough wind to curl the water and on a large loch it is very seldom that a dead calm prevails all day and can make his arrangements for a day weeks beforehand whereas the stream fisher is dependent for a good take on the state of the water and however pleasant and easy it may be for one living near the banks of a good trout stream or river it is quite another matter to arrange for a days river fishing if one is looking forward to a holiday at a date some weeks ahead providence may favour the expectant angler with a good day and the water in order but experience has taught most of us that the good days are in the minority and that as is the case with our rapid running streams such as many of our northern streams are the water is either too large or too small unless as previously remarked you live near at hand and can catch it at its best a common belief in regard to loch fishing is that the tyro and the experienced angler have nearly the same chance in fishing the one from the stern and the other from the bow of the same boat of all the absurd beliefs as to loch fishing this is one of the most absurd try it give the tyro either end of the boat he likes give him a cast of ally flies he may fancy or even a cast similar to those which a crack may be using and if he catches one for every three the other has he may consider himself very lucky of course there are lochs where the fish are not abundant and a beginner may come across as many as an older fisher but we speak of lochs where there are fish to be caught and where each has a fair chance again it is said that the boatman has as much to do with catching trout in a loch as the angler well we dont deny that in an

untried loch it is necessary to have the guidance of a good boatman but the same argument holds good as to stream fishing

works performed by the orchestra during the past fifty years provides a significant record of changing trends in musical tastes a roster of all the players who have been members of the orchestra is given and the reference section also includes a complete list of out of town engagements and a list of the orchestra's recordings which are available

George Szell's Reign 2014-03-04

the south was no stranger to world s fairs prior to the end of the nineteenth century atlanta first hosted a fair in the 1880s as did new orleans and louisville but after the 1893 world s columbian exposition in chicago drew comparisons to the great exhibitions of victorian era england atlanta s leaders planned to host another grand exposition that would not only confirm atlanta as an economic hub the equal of chicago and new york but usher the south into the nation s industrial and political mainstream nashville and charleston quickly followed suit with their own exhibitions in the 1890s the perception of the south was inextricably tied to race and more specifically racial strife leaders in atlanta nashville and charleston all sought ways to distance themselves from traditional impressions about their respective cities which more often than not conjured images of poverty and treason in americans barely a generation removed from the civil war local business leaders used large scale expositions to lessen this stigma while simultaneously promoting culture industry and economic advancement atlanta s cotton states and international exposition presented the city as a burgeoning economic center and used a keynote speech by booker t washington to gain control of the national debate on race relations nashville s tennessee centennial and international exposition chose to promote culture over mainstream success and marketed nashville as a centennial city replete with neoclassical architecture drawing on its reputation as the athens of the south charleston s south carolina inter state and west indian exposition followed in the footsteps of atlanta s exposition its new class of progressive leaders saw the need to reestablish the city as a major port of commerce and designed the fair around a caribbean theme that emphasized trade and the corresponding economics that would raise charleston from a cotton exporter to an international port of interest bruce g harvey

studies each exposition beginning at the local and individual level of organization and moving upward to explore a broader regional context he argues that southern urban leaders not only sought to revive their cities but also to reinvigorate the south in response to northern prosperity local businessmen struggled to manage all the elements that came with hosting a world s fair including raising funds designing the fairs architectural elements drafting overall plans soliciting exhibits and gaining the backing of political leaders however these businessmen had defined expectations for their expositions not only in terms of economic and local growth but also considering what an international exposition had come to represent to the community and the region in which they were hosted harvey juxtaposes local and regional aspects of world s fair in the south and shows that nineteenth century expositions had grown into american institutions in their own right bruce g harvey is an independent consultant and documentary photographer with harvey research and consulting based in syracuse new york he specializes in historic architectural surveys and documentation photography

the state subsidies and philanthropy that traditionally allowed orchestras to flourish have greatly diminished in the wake of recent financial crises and the covid 19 pandemic as in other fields affected by the precarious labor arrangements prevalent in the world of work today it is the employees and freelancers in this case the musicians themselves who suffer most in this deeply knowledgeable and provocative book a highly acclaimed scholar who combines the roles of law professor music journalist and orchestral violinist presents the first major legal study to focus on labor relations and the institutional dynamics at play within orchestras drawing on personal interviews with more than 250 orchestral musicians and other stakeholders whose testimonies and actions often stand in contradiction to narratives provided by cultural economists and government cultural policymakers the author uncovers the deteriorating welfare of musicians in two countries the united states and the netherlands in which she has considerable practical orchestral experience the methodology will reverberate with great intensity to musicians worldwide with its novel system of movements that focus on different vulnerabilities besetting orchestral players to highlight such issues and topics as orchestra financing with a special focus on the nonprofit sector and the changing nature of state subsidies in europe the impact of the perception of orchestras as elitist and of limited social value discriminatory practices in auditions and hiring legal and practical relevance of contemporary questions of employee categorization regularly employed self employed false self employed and how fair practice codes and collective bargaining agreements can be designed implemented and enforced an interdisciplinary approach to a multiplicity of vulnerabilities in the sector the study incorporates economic historical and legal research along with a consideration of sociological factors case studies

from the eu court of justice the dutch supreme court the supreme court of the united states and the u s national labor relations board offer practical insight into specific legal issues including the fundamental question of how musician employees are differentiated from freelancers reflecting on the cutbacks and compromises that traumatize orchestral negotiations in today s musical world the book not only provides orchestral musicians with a wealth of useful information and suggestions for future action but also adds to the growing body of legal literature on the self limitations of labor law and the increasing vulnerability of workers practitioners in labor and employment law as well as academics in the field will benefit from a powerful analysis of workers vulnerabilities in today s labor market

in the long decade of 1839 1851 we meet symphonies of many names dramatic symphonies characteristic symphonies program symphonies poetic symphonies oriental symphonies symphony cantatas symphonic odes concert dramas hunting symphonies historical symphonies concert ballades choral symphonies and others a fair number of which are hybrid types using choral forces to combine purely musical elements with subject matter that is extra musical i have chosen to call this type of symphony the dramatic symphony not simply because berlioz gave that name to his roméo et juliette but because dramatic symphony suggests the active nature of the music a style in which the ultimate goal is not determined solely by musical considerations but by those and by concurrent drama it could be argued that the symphony was by its very nature contrasting movements competing orchestral motives transitional passages the development process already on a dramatic path from its very inception the chronicle here presented may appear to some therefore as the fulfilling of the

symphony s destiny to others as a losing of the way i have tried as much as possible to avoid such predications and pre established value judgments in order to present an account of events and the various challenges and responses of contemporaries a reception history
