in the early decades of the american republic american soldiers demonstrated and defined their beliefs about the nature of american republicanism and how they as citizens and soldiers were participants in the republican experiment through their service in for liberty and the republic ricardo a herrera examines the relationship between soldier and citizen from the war of independence through the first year of the civil war the work analyzes an idealized republican ideology as a component of soldiering in both peace and war herrera argues that american soldiers belief system the military ethos of republicanism drew from the larger body of american political thought this ethos illustrated and informed soldiers faith in an inseparable connection between bearing arms on behalf of the republic and earning and holding citizenship in it despite the undeniable existence of customs organizations and behaviors that were uniquely military the officers and enlisted men of the regular army states militias and wartime volunteers were the products of their society and they imparted what they understood as important elements of american thought into their service drawing from military and personal correspondence journals orderly books militia constitutions and other documents in over forty archives in twenty three states herrera maps five broad interrelated and mutually reinforcing threads of thought constituting soldiers beliefs virtue legitimacy self governance glory honor and fame and the national mission spanning periods of war and peace these five themes constituted a coherent and long lived body of ideas that informed american soldiers sense of identity for generations

in 1991 lawrence grossman wrote that a new political system is taking shape in the united states as we approach the twenty first century america is turning into an electronic republic a democratic system that is vastly increasing the people s day to day influence on decisions of state grossman s forecast implied a sea change in the way citizens would interact with and participate in their representative government a revamping of the way americans would do citizenship harnessing the power of technology to promote the ideal of democracy that first pulsed through our nation over 230 years ago may be a feasible achievement in a technocratic age but whether technology can help achieve a revolution as seismic as the political one that our founding fathers initiated may be a practical impossibility fusing the power of technology and democratic ideals opens opportunities for greater access to information and offers a medium for people to be heard and express their voice with dissemination to the masses through digital tools such as blogs podcasts and wikis indeed the emergence of the internet as a nearly ubiquitous element of american society has brought about new opportunities to enhance citizen engagement in democratic politics and to increase the level of civic engagement among american citizens despite such rhetoric however research has indicated that grossman s electronic republic has for the most part failed to come to fruition book cover

after the constitutional convention benjamin franklin was asked well doctor what have we got a republic or a monarchy franklin s response a republic if you can keep it this book argues we couldn t keep it a true republic privileges the common interest above the special interests to do this our constitution established an elaborate system of checks and balances that disperses power among the branches of government which it places in conflict with one another the framers believed that this would keep grasping covetous factions from acquiring enough power to dominate government instead only the people would rule proper institutional design is essential to this system each branch must manage responsibly the powers it is granted as well as rebuke the other branches when they go astray this is where subsequent generations have run into trouble we have overloaded our government with more power than it can handle the constitution s checks and balances have broken down because the institutions created in 1787 cannot exercise responsibly the powers of our sprawling immense twenty first century government the result is the triumph of special interests over the common interest james madison called this factionalism we know it as political corruption corruption today is so widespread that our government is not really a republic but rather a special interest democracy everybody may participate yes but the contours of public policy depend not so much on the common good as on the push and pull of the various interest groups encamped in washington dc

a comprehensive account of the origins design and history of the a 10a warthog highly recommended amps indianapolis includes photos the fairchild republic a 10a close support aircraft has become a legend over its long front line life known as the warthog due to her unusual appearance this little aircraft has built up an awesome reputation in the specialized ground attack role where her accuracy and deadliness are widely recognized as the best of their kind hard lessons from world war ii which were reinforced by the bitter experience of the vietnam war two decades later showed it was both impracticable and cost inefficient to use supersonic fighter jets in the close air support mission a requirement was therefore drawn up for a plane capable of carrying a heavy and varied load of ordnance which had good endurance and unprecedented maneuverability and could survive heavy ground fire thus the a 10 was born but by the time it came into service its role had changed to that of a tank buster in the defense of western europe in the face of the overwhelming numbers of soviet battle armor with her straight wing twin tails and turbine engines mounted high on her rear fuselage this single seat aircraft certainly presented a unique appearance but all these features served a vital role as peter c smith explains in this highly detailed study although the warthog s expected missions on the plains of germany did not materialize she did destroy hundreds of soviet built tanks during the gulf wars the a 10 has also flown almost continuous missions over the balkans against the taliban in afghanistan and isis in iraq and syria this beautifully illustrated and comprehensive volume brings the a 10 s incredible story right up to date
